Creature Feature!

- Lake Sturgeon, *Acipenser fulvescens*
- Canada's largest freshwater fish
- “Living fossils” – little change in body form since the Devonian
- Sturgeon, like salmon, return to spawn in the stream they were born each spring (can travel up to 400km)
- Bottom feeder with a cartilaginous skeleton
 - Lack of teeth, so it swallows prey whole
 - Barbels help the sturgeon locate bottom-dwelling prey
- Elongated, “torpedo-like” body that can grow over 2.2m (7.25ft) and up to 108kg (240lbs)
- Long-lived (up to 55 years)

Creature Feature!

- Vulnerable in the Great Lakes
 - Occurs in the Great Lakes and the St. Lawrence River, but also across most of north America
 - Habitat fragmentation and regulated water flow from dams are the greatest threats; other threats include invasive species, pollution, and poaching
- Previously killed as a nuisance by-catch because they damaged fishing gear; commercial fishery for meat and eggs brought in an average of 1800tonnes per year between 1879-1900
- Conservation efforts have increased understanding of Lake Sturgeon (radiotelemetry); strict regulations on harvest, water quality improvement, and the role of hatcheries have allowed the species to bounce back in the Great Lakes

Published Sept. 2015 in *North American Journal of Fisheries Management* 35(5)

- Previously accepted that telemetry tags shouldn't exceed 2% of the body weight, but there has been little field research justifying Winter's (1983) tag-weight guidance
- Studied the dispersal of 48 hatchery-raised fish in Wisconsin (Fox River and Wold River) with tags either 2% or 4% of their body weight
- Found that fish can handle larger tags (which may allow scientists to gather more detailed data or install more batteries so signals last longer)

PETITION TO THE GOVERNMENT OF CANADA

We, the undersigned residents of Canada, draw the attention of the Government of Canada to the following:

THAT TransCanada Corp. is applying to convert and extend a pipeline to transport tar sands crude from Empress, Alberta to Saint John, New Brunswick. The "Energy East" pipeline is expected to carry up to 1.1 million barrels of crude per day, including diluted bitumen, through Canadian communities and sensitive ecosystems and waterways. As shown by tar sands pipeline ruptures in Mayflower, Arkansas and in the Kalamazoo River in Michigan, a pipeline spill would have devastating impacts on land and water and endanger people's health. This pipeline would also encourage expansion in the tar sands, Canada's fastest growing source of greenhouse gas emissions, and the crude would be available to the highest bidders including larger, international markets.
